

Our second big announcement is that your board is once again working with the APS to hold a special WSP exhibition of all UN and UN Related material as a result of our great successful UNEXPO 17 in October of 2017. This new show is being considered once again for October in 2021, to coincide with the 70th anniversary of the first UN Stamps. I hope to be able to provide more details about this special exhibition once we receive formal approval by the APS and CANEJ Boards. Stay tuned and Happy Collecting.

Auction Guidelines

By B. Clement, Jr.

The UNPI Auction is one of the more popular features of UNP Membership. Over the years that I have been managing the auction, probably 30% of our members have taken advantage of the auction by selling unwanted UN material, or by bidding in the auction to try to acquire wanted UN gems that they have not found elsewhere. I urge you to participate. By doing so, you can benefit yourself and the club.

If you have something you would like to sell, please send me a list of your items, with a proposed minimum bid (MB). I generally advise sellers to set the MB at no more than 30% of the Gaines catalog value. The best results often result from bidding competition which is prompted by an attractive starting price. I will review your offerings, and accept material that I judge to be likely to sell.

If you see something offered in the auction that you would like to add to your collection, the amount of your bid should reflect how badly you want the item. Remember, if no one else bids, you win the lot at the MB. And even if there is competition, the selling price is just one increment higher than the second highest bid. Bidding is "blind", in that you don't know what the other bids are until the auction is over, when the second highest bid is revealed to bidders.

I have had complaints that the winner must have known what to bid, since he/she won it at slightly more than the complainer's bid. That's the way it works! The winning bidder may have really wanted it, and bid high, like 5 or 10 times the MB. Let's say the MB is \$20, you bid \$30, and another bidder bids \$100. The high bidder wins the lot at \$32, one increment over your bid.

Bids should be in the increments listed on the bid on the back wrapper. In not, they will be reduced to the next lower increment. For example, if you bid \$57, your bid will be reduced to \$55. This might make a difference if there was another bidder, an earlier bidder, who bid \$55. That bidder would win over you, since his \$55 bid arrived first.

If you don't see lots in your UN area, let me know what you would like to see, and I'll make an effort to find material to list that you might like.

Diwali Festival- New York Personalized Sheet

On October 19, 2018, UNPA issued a New York special event sheet to commemorate the festival of Diwali. Diwali, also known as Deepawali is the joyous and popular festival of lights, which is celebrated in India and by followers of many faiths across the world. During the five-day celebration clay lamps known as diyas are lit to signify the victory of good over evil. The festival also symbolizes the start of a New Year for many communities. The sheet in the denomination of \$1.15 contains ten stamps and tabs featuring festive lights and the symbolic lamps known as diyas. The background of the sheet features the UN Headquarters building illuminated with the message of "Happy Diwali" to celebrate the spirit of the festival. The sheet is shown on the Back Cover.

VERONA 2018 - VERONAFIL, Verona, Italy Special Event Mini-Sheet



On November 23, 2018, UNPA issued a new special event three stamp minisheet in the denominations of US\$ 1.15, CHF 2.00 and € 1.80 to commemorate the 131st VERONAFIL stamp show in Italy November 23-25, 2018. The stamp sheet features the Aida opera with the Arena di Verona. The sheet was illustrated by Chris Thornock (United States). A quantity of 18,000 were printed by La Poste (France).

THAILAND 2018 World Stamp Exhibition-Overprinted Special Event Mini-Sheet

On November 28, 2018, UNPA issued an overprinted special event mini-sheet to commemorate the Thailand 2018 World Stamp Exhibition in Bangkok, Thailand. The stamp sheet is the \$1.15 Dance sheet from 2016 International Dance Day.

A History of UN Collecting - UN Clubs, Part 6

Club of UN Collectors (CUNC)

In the Fall of 1968 a group of predominantly New York-based collectors decided to launch a new UN collectors group called the Club of UN Collectors. The Organization, founded by Richard Beresford, Viola Ilma, and Viola's cousin, her Ethiopian-Swiss cousin Honor R. Holland, was primarily aimed at educating young collectors about the UN and its stamps. This seems fitting as Viola had a lifelong passion regarding youth activism. She wrote "And Now, Youth!" a book published in 1934 about American young people, and in 1936, she organized the first American Youth Congress, a meeting in New York City of youth groups from across the nation.

Together they started publishing a nice 8.5 x 11 multi-page newsletter, called "The UN Collector." The first issue comprised of 12 pages was released in January 1969 and contained some very nice articles on UN collecting, including one by David Alexander (who was a long-standing officer in the United Nations Philatelic Society), entitled "Why Not Collect UN Stamps." (Figure 1) Each issue of the newsletter, published monthly except for July and August, contained interesting articles about UN activities and information about upcoming UN stamps. The publication contained some very lovely images provided by the UN Department of Public Information and helped educate a generation about the organization. Other notable contributors included Mel Garabrandt, William Numeroff, and Dr. P.J. West.




Figure 2: Card Issued at the First International All Junior Stamp and Literature Exhibition (INJ-UN-PEX), 1974. Show was sponsored by the Club of UN Collectors and was held at the Biltmore Hotel in New York City, July 5-7, 1974

One nice feature of the newsletter was that it was mailed from the UN Headquarters, and often had a very nice slogan or roller cancel for the recipient. In addition to the newsletter, the CUNC was instrumental in establishing and promoting the INJUNPEX International Youth Philatelic Exhibitions. The first such show was held at the Hotel Biltmore in New York City, in July of 1974. Several souvenir covers and cards are known from the exhibition, as well as special slogan cancels and cachets (Figures 2,3,4,5). INJUNPEX exhibitions continued until at least 1979. The second was held in Guadalajara, Mexico

July 6-12, 1975 (Figures 6-7). An IN-JUNPEX was held in New York in 1979 as part of the ASDA National Postage Stamp Show.

I have several pieces of correspondence from the club including various legal size envelopes bearing interesting illustrated corner cards (Figures 8, 9, 10), and a larger mailer which I believe were used to distribute the newsletters in latter years (Figure 11). Most of these bore a return address from PO Box 400 Madison Square Station, New York, NY 10010, however sometime prior to May 1973 the address PO Box 238, Glenside, PA 19038 was used.

My last known issue of "The UN Collector," is Volume 4 number 3 issued in August 1973. Again, this issue was mailed from the Glenside, PA address (Figure 12). I'm not sure why the club ceased to continue after this time. I




Figure 7: 2nd INJUNPEX Souvenir Card. Showing UN stamps






The UN Headquarters Exhibit Epilogue #2


In this addition of the UN Headquarters exhibit we shall focus on the final addition to the current exhibit that presents some of the wonderful artwork donated to the UN by member-nations. See Centerfold. The UN Headquarters is really a world-class museum filled with beautiful paintings, sculptures, tapestries, carvings, and even stained glass. The major assembly halls in the complex were gifts of Denmark, Finland, and Sweden and several of their famed artists and architects. Note also with this newest version, in addition to the demarcation lines to separate the storylines, I have added Section numbers to match those provided on the title page plan. These two simple but effective modifications provides a clear roadmap for the viewer to understand where in the exhibit they are and what specific material supports a given portion of the story. Happy Collecting.

16. The Interior Design and Artwork from Around the World

While construction of the buildings continued the Architects and Engineers toiled over the requirements for the Headquarters interior spaces. Consideration was given to the number and compliment of member nation representatives to the Economic and Social Council, Security Council, and Trusteeship Council, as well as all the supporting staff necessary to carry out the functions of the respective organizations. Accommodations for guests and dignitaries were also evaluated; as was space for the hundreds of members of the Permanent Secretariat staff. Both ingress and egress pathways throughout the complex were considered to ensure adequate facilities, providing efficient travel, were designed into the buildings.

Results of the Planning Commission and Board of Architects and Engineers study to define the requirements for the United Nations Headquarters Complex.

As the interior space concepts evolved, member nations created special gifts to adorn the complex interiors with splendid works of Art representing the many peoples, cultures, and ethnicities represented by the United Nations. These gifts included, both materials for construction and expertise in construction and fabrication, as well as, finished paintings, tapestries, sculptures, and other artifacts. Often these precious objects were the works of great contemporary masters such as Chagall, Miro, Dali, Rockwell, and many others. To this day, member nations continue to donate important, meaningful, dramatic, and of course, beautiful works of art to inspire the UN staff and excite the many thousands of visitors to the complex annually.

The Major Chambers - Economic and Social Council, Trusteeship Council and the Security Council Chamber.

All three of these spaces were designed by Scandinavian designers, primarily at the request of William Harrison, after each Country offered to provide their assistance. Swedish designer Sven Markelius, Danish architect Finn Juhl, and Norway's Arnstein Arneberg are credited with the designs for the Economic and Social, Trusteeship, and Security Council chambers, respectively.

Japanese Peace Bell was gifted to the United Nations in 1964 by the UN Association of Japan.


The bell was cast from coins from people in over 60 nations.

The structure surrounding the bell is made of cypress wood in the design of a Shinto Shrine.

The inscription on the bell reads "Long Live Absolute World Peace."

"The Four Seasons and the Genius of the Year," is a third century mosaic which was given to the United Nations by Tunisia in 1961. It is located in the Delegates North lounge at the Headquarters.

Brazilian Peace Mural - entitled "War" and "Peace" were presented to the United Nations by Brazil in 1957. The murals, each measuring 34 by 46 feet, were painted by the late Brazilian artist Candido Portinari. They are located on the east and west walls of the delegates' lobby on the ground floor in the General Assembly building.

General Assembly entrance door bronze reliefs executed in nickel-plated bronze was designed by Ernest Cormier, an architect on the design team. The panels were a gift of Canada.




4th International Conference on Plasma Physics and Controlled Nuclear Fusion Research, Madison, 1971












