2021 ENDANGERED SPECIES

On April 7, the United Nations Postal Administration will issue its 2021 Endangered Species stamps featuring species of fauna and flora that are endemic to a certain environment or region.

The Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) is an international agreement between Governments. Currently having 183 States Parties, the Convention aims to ensure that the international trade of specimens of wild animals and plants does not threaten their survival.

For over 25 years, the United Nations Postal Administration has issued stamps to celebrate the many beautiful and varied forms of wild fauna and flora worldwide with the intent to raise awareness about the multiple benefits of conservation.



2021 CHINESE LUNAR CALENDAR – YEAR OF THE OX NEW YORK SPECIAL EVENT SHEET US\$ 1.20

On January 22, 2021, the United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) concluded its Chinese Lunar Calendar series with the issuance of a special event sheet celebrating the Year of the Ox. This is the twelfth sheet issued for UNPA's Lunar New Year stamp series, which completes the entire zodiac cycle in the series. The sheet is composed on ten US\$ 1.20 denominated stamps with the United Nations logo. The stamps' tabs and background feature artworks designed by Wang Huming (China).

The Chinese Lunar New Year's Day is February 12, 2021 which starts the year of the Ox and lasts until January 30, 2022. It will be a Metal Ox year. The previous zodiac years of the Ox sign are: 1961, 1973, 1985, 1997, 2009, 2021. People born in the year of the Ox are known for diligence, dependability, strength, determination and honesty. Showing great patience and a desire to make progress, Oxen can achieve their goals through consistent effort. They are not easily influenced by others or by their environment but persist in doing things in accordance with their ideals.



United Nations Stamps with Non-United Nations Postmarks

The concept of a United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) emerged early in 1947 and continued through the years with numerous meetings of the UN Committees, the Universal Postal Union (UPU), United States Postal Service (USPS) and the UN General Assembly (GA). In November 1950 the GA adopted a Resolution to establish the UNPA. The UNPA would sell stamps to be recognized and delivered by the USPS. All mail would be postmarked only by the United Nations Post Office (UNPO). Agreements were signed in March 1951 between the USPS and UNPA and later with the UPU in July 1951. (1)

So how does mail go through the USPS with a non-UNPO postmark? I'll discuss two possible reasons based on samples I have in my collection.




Fig. 1: Samples of Group-UNNY 1 and 6 Cancelled with Oval Cancel, HONOLULU, HAWAII

UNNY 1-7 and 9-11 (Samples in Figure 1) - all strips of two cancelled with HONOLULU HAWAII in an oval postmark. These appear to be cancelled-to-order. This may have been done as a favor to a friend by a Postal employee even though it was illegal.

UNNY 21 (Figure 2) - Letter postmarked NEW YORK GRAND CEN-TRAL STATION and sent to Indianapolis, Ind. This is obviously an error but by who? The letter was postmarked December 24, 1953, right at the height of the Christmas season rush. Could it have been passed by a temporary employee who did not know the regulations ? By a regular employee who did not care or did not look at it? By a machine ? However it got through it was delivered through the Indianapolis Post Office. Again illegal -Should postage due have been collected?

Editor's note: As a teenager, I sent many UN FDC's to UN officials and delegates in New York, asking for their autographs. I sent UN stamps to be used for return postage. Some of the delegates mailed the autographed FDC to me from a NY, NY post office, using the UN stamps. These went through unchallenged, as did Bob's Fig. 2 cover. Unfortunately, I haven't found any of those covers yet, but will keeping looking.

UNESCO Science Program, Part 2

This is the second installment of a series on UNESCO's Science Program. In the February Journal, the organization of the Science Program was discussed. This article continues with UNESCO conferences and meetings in the field of Science, illustrated by their postal history.

UNESCO International Conference for the Diffusion of Science, Madrid, 1955

To date, I have been unable to find documentation of this conference in Google searches, searches of the UNESCO website, or in the 1955 UN Yearbook. The UN Yearbook does mention a "Science Fair" held in Madrid in 1955, but no details are given. Any information that anyone can provide would be appreciated.

1st International Oceanographic Congress, United Nations, NY, 1959

The International Oceanographic Congress was organized by the American Association for the Advancement of Science in collaboration with UNESCO and the International Council of Scientific Unions and held at United Nations Headquarters in New York from August 31 to September 11. About 1,200 specialists from 40 countries attended the congress. It resulted not only in many fruitful exchanges between men of science, but brought out that very little is known about the deep seas, their movements and resources. One direct outcome of this congress was a decision to hold a further international conference at Copenhagen in July 1960 to discuss the establishment of an integrated system of oceanographic research vessels. 2nd International Oceanographic Congress, Moscow, 1966

The second International Oceanographic Congress was held in Moscow, USSR, from May 30 to June 9, 1966. 1767 participants attended from 57 countries. The Congress was organized by the USSR Academy of Science through agreement with UNESCO and with the support of the FAO, and WMO, the International Atomic Energy Agency and the Scientific Committee on Oceanic Research.

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IAEA/UNESCO Conference on Radioisotopes in the Physical Sciences and Industry, Copenhagen, 1960

This was an IAEA Conference organized with the cooperation of UNESCO, held in Copenhagen, Denmark, September 5-17, 1960. The conference was a sequel to earlier conferences held in Oxford (1951, 1954), and Paris (1957) and emphasized recent developments. Subjects included geophysics, metallurgy and solidstate physics, nuclear physics and industrial applications of tracers, absorption and scattering, detectors and instrumentation, analytical chemistry, labeled compounds, organic chemistry and physical chemistry. 


Fig. 19: Cover from Conference, Sep. 16, 1960

UNESCO Symposium on the Impact of Man on Humid Tropics Vegetation, Goroka, 1960

This symposium was held in Goroka, Papua and New Guinea, September 14-20, 1960. 38 papers were presented, the majority on New Guinea and the Philippines. Most of the papers dealt with the impact of early man, in his selection, domestication and cultivation of food crops, in his use of fire, and in the effect of grazing of domestic animals. <u>UNESCO Conference on the Application of Science & Technology to the Development of Asia, New Delhi,</u> <u>1968</u>

This conference, known by the acronym CASTASIA, was held in New Delhi, India, August 9-20, 1968. There was a UN worldwide conference on the subject held in Geneva in 1963. This is a regional meeting organized by UNESCO to carry on the program in Asia. The conference was held in a New Delhi conference center called "Vigyan Bhawan". (Journal of UNP, Dec. 2016, 40-6, page 21)

UNESCO Symposium on Productivity Problems of Fresh Waters, Kaziemerz Dolny, Poland, 1970

This symposium was held in Kazimierz Dolny, Poland May 7-12, 1970. It was sponsored by the International Biological Program (IBP) of UNESCO. Among the factors studied were fresh water geology, climate, hydrology, chemistry and human activity and their effect on growth of plants, invertebrates and fish.




Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission Working Group, Malta, 1971

Stamps of the Saar Plebiscite

Introduction

A couple years ago a friend gave me a box that held her father's stamp collection. She asked me to look it over to see if there was anything of value. I was told I could keep whatever I wanted. Many of the stamps were from 1930s Germany as her father had left Germany during that decade. I gave her back the mint US (mostly 3-cent plate blocks but also some modern stamps) so she could use them for postage. I also returned some German coins. I kept this sheet of cancelled plebiscite stamps along with a few other interesting items. The remainder went to my local stamp club and ended up in the quarterly auction. The fun was in going through the box and organizing it. And then researching things like the stamps illustrated in this article. So where is the Saar Region, what was the plebiscite (vote), and what about these stamps?

The Saar




Fig. 1: Territory of the Saar Basin (from Wikipedia)

The Saar Basin is a region in Germany that borders France and Luxembourg along the Saar River (see Figure 1). The current capitol is Saarbrucken (Saar bridge). It has been contested between France and Germany many times. Howard Geisler, in his award-winning article on Saarland in the November 2009 issue of *The American Philatelist*, provides an excellent background on the history of the region and its stamps. Its strategic importance is due to its many coal deposits and mines.

After World War I, Germany ceded the territory. Under Article 49 of the Treaty of Versailles, the area was administered by the League of Nations mandate for 15 years from 1920 to 1935. France gained control of the mines during that time period. Greg Galletti, in his excellent article on the League of Nations in the February

2020 issue of *The American Philatelist*, discusses the Saar Basin and the plebiscite and illustrates this with a cover in his Figure 6. In addition, Richard Powers provides an in-depth look at the administration of the Saar Territory and the plebiscite in his article in the February 1998 issue of *The Journal of United Nations Philatelists*. In Figure 10, Powers shows some of the stamps, but since the illustration is in black and white, it is hard to see the detail on the stamps.

The Plebiscite (Vote)

As part of the mandate, a referendum on the status of the Saar was held in the region on January 13, 1935. As part of the administration of this vote, peacekeeping troops from Great Britain, Sweden, the Netherlands, and Italy were invited to help oversee the event. Over 90% of the voters choose reunification with Germany with 9% voting for the status quo and less than 0.5% opting for unification with France.

There was great interest by the Nazis in gaining control of this rich region and they conducted an extensive propaganda campaign (Hitler had been in power for two years at this time). On January 17, 1935, the territory's reunion with Germany was approved by the League Council and on March 1 the region was re-integrated into Germany under Nazi control.

The Stamps

During the period from 1920 to 1935, the League of Nations established its own postal administration and issued numerous stamps in denominations of French centimes and francs.

In 1927 a new definitive series came out with each stamp printed in a single-color using photogravure in denominations of 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, 60, 75, 80, and 90 centime along with 1, 1.5, 2, 3, and 5 francs. In preparation for the plebiscite, this series was overprinted on November 1, 1934 with "VOLKSABSTIMMUNG / 1935". The German word "volksabstimmung" means "plebiscite" in English and is printed centered on the stamps. These are overprints of Scott 120 to 128 and 130 to 135, now numbered by Scott as 139 to 153 (Scott 129 was an 80 centime that was not overprinted). Scott 154 is an overprint of Scott 119 in a 10-franc denomination, originally issued in 1925. In similar fashion a set of airmail stamps, C1 to C4 in denominations of 50 centime and 1 franc as well as 60 centime and 5 francs, were also overprinted, and now identified by Scott as C5 to C8. These are the last stamps issued by the League of Nations for Saar.

Table 1 shows information regarding this issue including Scott number, denomination, orientation of stamp, place of the 1935, color, and the design.

The 1935 is printed in three positions: left, center, and right. It is left on the 20, 40, 60, and 90 centime definitives and the 60 centime and 5-franc airmail; center on the 10, 15, 30, 50, and 75 centime and 10 frank definitives; right on the 25 centime and 1, 1.5, 2, 3, and 5 franc definitives along with the 50 centime and 1 franc airmail.

Five designs are repeated throughout the definitive stamps: the Market Fountain at St Johann (10 and 30 centime), a View of Saar Valley (15, 20, 25, 40, 50, 75, and 90 centime), the Colliery Shafthead (60 centime and 1 franc), the Burbach Steelworks (1.5, 2, 3, and 5 francs), and the Madonna of Blieskastel (10 francs).

The seven stamps, all identified as "View of Saar Valley" by Scott in Figure A32 of its listing on Saar, actually show <u>three</u> different scenes: the 15 and 75 centime values show a valley with a river, the 20, 40, and 90

centime values show a building alongside the Saar River, and the 25 and 50 centime values show Tholey Abbey. Tholey Abbey is a Benedictine monastery dedicated to Saint Maurice; it was started about 750 AD, dissolved in 1794 during the French Revolution, and reestablished as a monastery in 1949. I think the Scott catalogue needs to be updated to accurately reflect the stamp designs.

The town of Saint Johann, founded in 1353, along with the towns of Burbach-Malstatt and Sankt Arnua were incorporated into Saarbrücken in 1909. Saint Johann's most prominent feature is the Fountain in its main elongated square. The Colliery Shafthead essentially depicts the towers above the shaft leading to an underground coal mine. The Burbach Steelworks, one of three major steel plants in the Saar, was founded in 1856 and merged with the Volkinger steelworks in 1971. The Madonna of Blieskastel or Our Lady of the Arrows is a 14th century oak pieta that currently resides in the Holy Cross Monastery Chapel in Blieskastel in Saar.

Two designs are shown for the four airmail stamps: an airplane over Saarbrucken (50 centime and 1 franc) and the Saarbrucken Airport and Church of St. Arnual (60 centime and 5 francs). The gothic Saint Arnual

Collegiate Church was erected in the 13th and 14th centuries. The airplane over Saarbrucken on the 50 centime and 1-franc stamps is a biplane while the airplane over the airport (60 centime and 5 franc) is a monoplane.

Figure 2 shows these overprinted stamps except the two highest values for the definitive series (5 and 10 francs) and the airmail series (1 and 5 francs), cancelled on the day of the vote (except for the 10-centime value). Two of the stamps are vertical (10 and 30-centime, the Market Fountain at Saint Johann) while the rest are horizontal. These were all cancelled at Volklingen, a town about six miles west of Saarbrucken on the Saar River. The cancels line up with the direction of the stamp. There are two notations at the bottom of the sheet: "DO NOT separate stamps" and "stamped on the day of the plebiscite!" Stamps cancelled on the date of the plebiscite are rare and this sheet is most likely unique.

Summary

I enjoy learning about new things and researching the history behind them. Although I do not collect stamps related to the League of Nations, I do collect the stamps, stationery, and souvenir cards of its successor the United Nations. These stamps intrigued me and so I began digging into them and why they were issued. The enjoyment I experienced in this process is why I love stamp collecting.



The Hague Secret Emissary Affair




Fig. 1: 1946 UN-Hunter College Cover sent to London and returned. Used UN New York meter PB 113436, June 3, 1946

The Russian and Japanese Empires were rivals for control of Manchuria (China) and Korea (Figure 1) at the turn of the 19th century for trade and economic advantage. The Japanese were wary of Russian expansion into the far east which they considered within the Japanese sphere of Asian influence.

Japan's proposal to solve the problem - Russia should control Manchuria and Japan would control Korea. This solution was not acceptable to Russia. Fearing further Russian incursion into Asia, Japan went to war to protect their interests and the Russo-Japanese War (Figure 2) ensued in 1904 with the Japanese victorious in 1905. Japan formalized control of Korea despite objections voiced by the Korean Emperor.


1907, In world powers met in the *Ridderzaal* in The Hague, Netherlands for the Second Hague Peace Conference (Figure 3). The first peace conference had been held in 1899. This second conference was a continuation of the first to expand the previous agreements with regard to war.

Initially considered for attendance by Queen Wilhelmina (1880– 1962) (Figure 4), Korea was not invited at the behest of Japanese diplomats declaring Japan the legal representative of Korea.

The goal of this effort was that the emissaries would attend the peace conference and declare Korea an independent empire. He hoped that by doing so and stating the Korean position, the world nations in attendance would approve of the declaration and Japan's hold on Korea would be released.

This secret contingent of three traveled on the Trans-Siberian Railroad (Figure 7) for two months before reaching the Hague.

On arrival in the Hague, the trio were denied entry into the Ridderzaal conference site. Although unable to enter, they brought the Emperor's letter of charges before journalists as well as an independent newspaper's press conference for publication. The letter outlined reasons for Korea to become a sovereign nation, independent of Japan; something the Japanese were determined to stop.

Yi Tjoune protested the delegates' refusal for entry and continued speaking out against Japanese policy to any officials outside the conference who would listen.

Yi was found dead several days later in his room at the Hotel De Jong (Figure 8) with no known cause of death recorded. The hotel has since been converted into the *Yi Jun Peace Museum* in Yi's honor. The museum contains many handwritten notes, documents, news articles from the period as well as other items.

Theories for the death ranged from an accidental fall to assassination by Japanese spies. Yi however did become ill during the trip. Was he possibly poisoned? Tjyongoui Yi buried Yi Tjoune in Oud Eik en Duinen cemetery in The Hague.

The mysterious death of Yi Tjoune was romanticized by the Korean Empire and the story of his death portrayed as a public suicide witnessed by the international delegates during a conference session. Such a scene is even depicted on a North Korean stamp issue (Figure 9) marking his death anniversary. As the three delegates were never allowed into the hall of the proceedings, this story is only a myth.

After the incident, and likely as punishment, Emperor Gojong was forced to abdicate the throne in favor of his son Sunjong. A short while thereafter, he was taken into Japanese custody and lived the

remainder of his life in Deoksu Palace. Yi is celebrated today as a national hero in both North and South Korea.

Fun with Forerunners No. 4

The UN service cover shown here is from the first temporary Headquarters of the United Nations at Hunter College, in the Bronx, NY. (Figure 1). Hunter College was initially offered to the UN by then NYC Mayor William O'Dwyer in the Spring of 1946, and the first UN Security Council Meetings were held there in the fall after several campus auditoriums that had been converted to suitable meeting space during the summer months. Unfortunately with the college classes commencing in the Fall, the UN was requested to vacate Hunter College in late 1946.

The cover corner card bears the address of the College at Bronx 63 New York, along with an additional address of Box 1000 New York 1, NY, which was located at the New York City General Post Office in Manhattan. Service covers from the Hunter College period are know with return addresses from both of these as well as incoming mail addressed to either location and forwarded as necessary. The cover also bears a lovely Pitney Bowes meter impression PB113436, and UN Forerunner Slogan cancel (Type II) "Provisional UN Emblem." The provisional emblem's origin dates back to the United Nations Conference on International Organization, which convened in San Francisco, California, in April 1945. According to *Gaines United Nations Philately*, The PB machine 113436 was used from March 1946 - December 1946 at the Hunter College Location, making it a fairly scarce meter imprint in use for only a few months.

The letter was sent to a Mr. Perera at the Catalan Home of Great Britain. A quick internet search described the Catalan House as serving as a quasi-governmental office for the region's representatives in Great Britain for the promotion of all areas and sectors where the Catalan government (*for Spanish region of Catalonia*) has powers: economy, tourism, culture and institutional affairs. Apparently Mr. Perera was not at that location when the letter arrived as indicated by the various auxiliary markings on the cover. Two of these (in dark Violet) appear to have been added at the Destination postal office located in the EC 5 district in London. The Third imprint with the pointing finger, would have been applied at the NYC GPO upon its return.

You will also note two hole punch marks in the lower portion of the cover which have been repaired. This is indicative of mail that was held by the UN during the early years and de-accessed in the late 1950's to early 1960's to make room available for other necessary activities.




Fig. 15: Hong Kong, Scott #2087 issued June 23, 2020






Fig. 20: Moldova Michel #1129, Jan. 27, 2020
