**Rating "Domestic" United Nations New York (UNNY) Postal History with Beecher and Wawrukiewicz**



The United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) rates are the same rates as the United States Postal Service (USPS) rates and the stamp/increments are in U.S. dollars/cents.

Only a few pieces of postal history / rates will be shown but by looking at the examples in this presentation, it is hoped that you'll be able to rate covers in your own collection.

Many of the tables in this presentation are abridged as only a subset is needed for this presentation. Some of the table data becomes really complicated and the USPS had many different rates for extra ounces on letters.

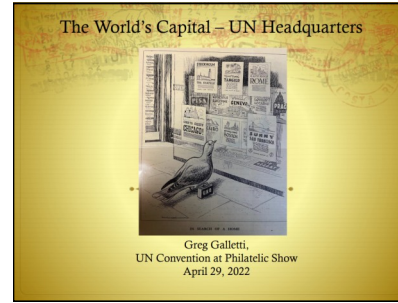

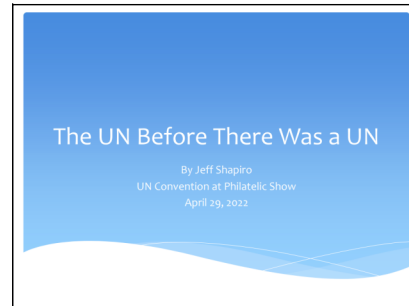

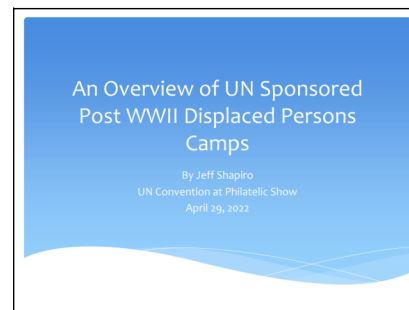

## BTA Virtual One-Page Competition, March 2022

The British Thematic Association (BTA) sponsored a Virtual One-Page Exhibit Competition in March 2022, open to anyone, free of charge. They received 105 exhibits from the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, Peru, Italy, Belgium, Morocco, India and New Zealand. Two of our UNP members, Greg Galletti and Fran Adams submitted exhibits. The exhibits were judged competitively. Awards given were Diamond, Ruby, Emerald and Opal. The Diamond award compares to a Large Gold in regular competitive judging. Best in Class Awards were given in 1) Open Philately, 2) Thematic-Culture, 3) Thematic-Nature, 4) Thematic-Science and Technology, 5) Topical, 6) Youth 10-15, and 7) Youth 16-18.

In the Open Class, Galletti won a Diamond for his exhibit: The World's Capitol - The UN Headquarters. Adams also won a Diamond for a non-UN exhibit: Sir Arthur Keith - Perpetrator or Victim?

In the Thematic-Culture Class, Adams won a Ruby award for his UN exhibit: The Arcadia Conference.

## United Nations stamps celebrate Human Achievement on Planet Mars

On April 24, 2022, the United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) issued six stamps and three souvenir sheets to celebrate human achievements on Planet Mars.

As an inseparable cosmic companion of Earth, Mars has often been a source of curiosity for humans and scientists of all nations. The space community has long strived to uncover its mysteries and has made some exceptional steps forward in 2021. In a historic year for Mars exploration, three missions reached their destinations on and around the Red Planet. This stamp series celebrates those pioneering achievements.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Mars 2020 mission landed in Jezero Crater, Mars on February 18, 2021. The Mission includes the Perseverance Rover and the Ingenuity Helicopter. The duration is expected to last at least one Mars year (about 687 Earth days). The objective of the Mission is to seek signs of ancient life and collect samples of rock and soil samples for possible return to Earth.

The United Arab Emirates (UAE) mission to Mars launched its Hope Probe to study the Martian atmosphere and climate. It successfully entered Martian orbit on February 9, 2022. Hope's first yearThe orbiter confirmed the existence of a discrete aurora, a highly localized atmospheric phenomenon on the night side of the planet, and took note of water-bearing clouds that grow and shrink daily.

The CHF 2,00 souvenir sheet features UAE Hope Probe

The China National Space Administration (CNSA) launched its first Mars mission "Tianwen-1", which consisted of an orbiter, two deployable cameras, lander, remote camera, and the Zhurong Rover. The mission landed on Martian surface on May 15, 2021. The objectives of the mission are to investigate Martian surface geology and internal structure, search for indications of current and past presence of water and characterize the space environment and the atmosphere of Mars.

As humankind races toward Mars, it is important that countries work together to promote international cooperation and peaceful use and exploration of space, and in the utilization of space science and technology for sustainable economic and social development. # Digital Exhibiting

Digital exhibiting has found a footing since Covid-19 swept the world 2 years ago. Collectors were unable to gather and physical shows were temporarily postponed. As a result of this challenging environment, digital exhibiting has grown and now, single page exhibiting is taking a leap forward, sponsored by national societies.

Digital single page exhibits have been promoted in Canada, Great Britain, South Africa and the U.S. from local to national levels with international participation. The American Topical Association for instance, is sponsoring a non-competitive 'single page virtual exhibition' and has over 130 entries for GASS 2022.

The latest British Thematic Association (BTA) virtual competition just ended in March 2022 and had exhibits evaluated by a jury.

These pages are fun and those 'cool' items in the collection without a specific place can be exactly what's needed to build a single page exhibit. So, how do you do it? It's easy so let's do one together and you don't need high dollar items to do it.

1. Select the item you would like to be the center of attention. I don't collect military mail but I thought this cover was 'cool', so it's out of the odd items shoebox (and yes, it's a real shoebox) and onto the page.

2. Write a short title.

3. Do a little reading on your chosen subject. Wikipedia is a great starting point and you often need little else. Write a short and descriptive text about the subject/event.

4. Select a few additional items to populate the page. In this case, stamps depicting the Congo Crisis (U.N. stamp for the crisis) and Dag Hammarskjöld (Swedish stamp is good connection).

5. Arrange the items on the page and drop one or two text blocks in using the sequence in the story line. Space everything to achieve a nice presentation.

6. Voilà! - You just completed your first virtual single page. After saving as a pdf file or scanning it, you can join the fun in virtual shows.

This is an opportunity for fun and pleasure, without the stress of competing to win an award. We're just showing our creativity, interests and a 'cool' item or two. And with the ATA exhibition for example, there's not even an entry fee!

# Why I Collect UN Stamps

## Introduction

I began collecting stamps in 1979 at the age of 30 years when I was stationed in the Washington, DC area. I did not collect as a youngster as many now older collectors did. The only stamp group I joined back then was the American Philatelic Society in June 1979. It was not until after I retired (the second time in 2015) that I joined other stamp organizations – the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors (AAPE) in 2018, the American Topical Association (ATA) in 2018, the Pacific Northwest Postal History Society (PNPHS) in 2019, and the United Nations Philatelists, Inc (UNPI) in 2021. I also joined the local stamp club, the Greater Eugene Stamp Society (GESS), in 2012. I only recently started stamp exhibiting (primarily topical/thematic) in 2018.

## Boy Scout National Jamboree

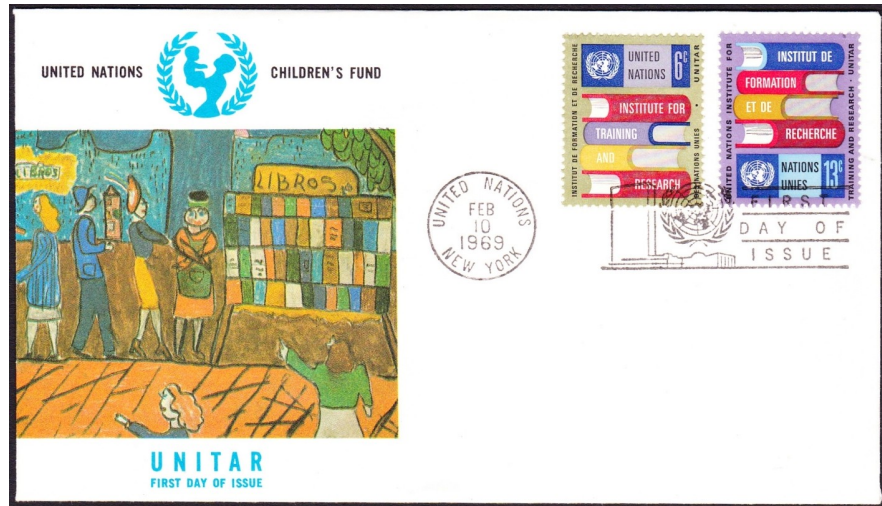


Fig. 1: UNICEF Cachet #1 for UNITAR Issue, Small Cancel

However, even at the early age of 15 in 1964, I was interested in the United Nations (UN). I was a member of one of nine troops from the Portland Area Council in Portland, Oregon that attended the Sixth National Boy Scout Jamboree in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania from July 17-23, 1964. We traveled by train, with one passenger car per troop, going back east, with stops to visit places in Salt Lake City, Denver, Chicago, Detroit, Washington DC, Philadelphia, and New York City. While in New York we attended the 1964 World's Fair and toured the UN Headquarters building. Part of the tour included the General Assembly chamber and the grounds, which very much impressed me, along with the row of individual nation flags. I still have a scout neckerchief with the UN emblem on it (see Figure 1). On a side note, I earned my Eagle Scout badge at age 14 in 1963, but never did get the Stamp Collecting merit badge.

## UN Collection

As the same time that I started collecting United States stamps, I also started my United Nations collection. I now have a standing order with the UN Postal Administration (UNPA). My UN stamp collection in White Ace binders is complete, including the Scott UN NY #38 souvenir sheet (I actually have two copies now). But back in 1980, I really wanted to get that souvenir sheet, so I talked my wife into letting me sell our old 1971 Chevy Nova for \$500 and using the proceeds to purchase the mint sheet (we celebrated our 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary last year, so she kept me). At that time, I expected the price to keep going up, but shortly after the stamp market fell apart because the speculation bubble burst. The

second mint sheet I purchased just a few years ago for only \$25 at a stamp club auction. I am hoping to complete my mint UN stationery and souvenir card collection soon.

## Preamble to the UN Charter

I have always been interested in history and the idea that a single world government would be helpful to prevent war and secure peace and prosperity. I think that people should live in peace, understanding that we are all much more alike than different. I am a big fan of Star Trek and the United Federation of Planets, where each member planet is governed by a single world government. The Preamble of the UN Charter, signed in April 1945, contains the ideals that I saw reflected in the UN General Assembly back in 1964 (see Preamble below).

### *Preamble*

#### ***WE THE PEOPLES OF THE UNITED NATIONS DETERMINED***

*to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and*

*to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small, and*

*to establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and*  
*to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,*

#### ***AND FOR THESE ENDS***

*to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbors, and*

*to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security, and*  
*to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the institution of methods, that armed force shall not be used, save in the common interest, and*

*to employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all peoples,*

#### ***HAVE RESOLVED TO COMBINE OUR EFFORTS TO ACCOMPLISH THESE AIMS.***

*Accordingly, our respective Governments, through representatives assembled in the city of San Francisco, who have exhibited their full powers found to be in good and due form, have agreed to the present Charter of the United Nations and do hereby establish an international organization to be known as the United Nations.*

Several UN stamps have been issued that include the first part of the Preamble, all from the New York office, but none since 1978:

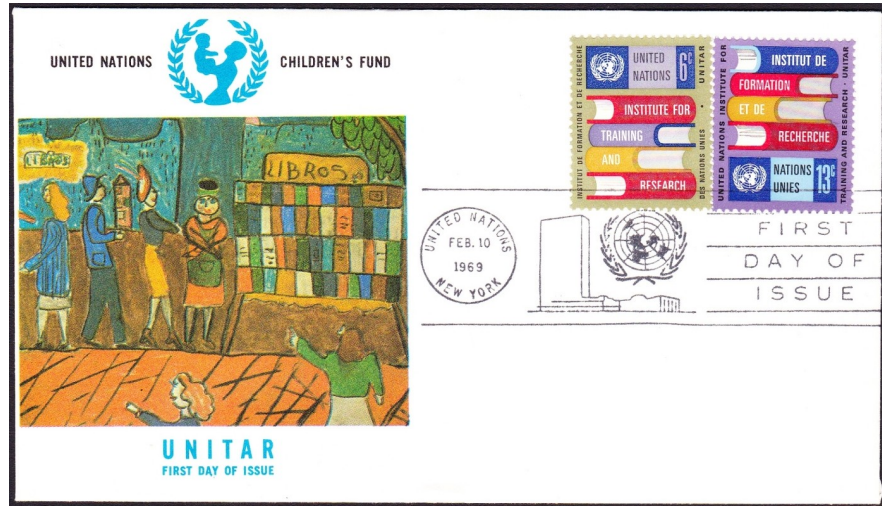


Fig. 2: UNICEF Cachet #1 for UNITAR Issue, Large Cancel

Scott #35 (3 cent deep plum), #36 (4 cent dull green), #37 (8 cent bluish black), and #38 souvenir sheet, issued October 24, 1955, for 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary (“We the peoples of the United Nations”) (see Figure 2)

Scott #83 (4 cents blue), #84 (8 cent gray), and #85 souvenir sheet, issued October 24, 1960, for 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary (“WE THE PEOPLES OF THE UNITED NATIONS DETERMINED to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war”) (see Figure 3)

Scott #147 (15 cent multicolored), issued 1965 (“We the peoples of the United Nations determined to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war”) (see Figure 4)

Scott #291 (1 cent multicolored), issued January 27, 1978 (“We the peoples of the United Nations determined to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war”) (see Figure 5)

# Update on 1969 UNICEF First Day Covers

In 1969 the United States Committee for UNICEF issued a series of special FDCs from February to June 1969. Gaines covers the basic information on Page 505 of the catalog. The series is a beautiful pocket FDC collection for collectors using striking cachet art and a number of cancel varieties making assembling a complete collection challenging, but doable.

This article will update all known additional information on these unusual FDCs.

Correcting a typo in the Gaines catalog. On issue #4 (Scott 199-200). The Gaines catalog lists the number as #199-299. The correct number is #199-200.

The complete set according to the Gaines catalog are the following:

#1 Scott #192-193 (issued for UNITAR) exist as singles, combo and as MI4s.

#2 Scott #194-195 (issued for UN economic development in Latin America) exist as singles, Combo and MI4.

#2b Scott #196 (issued as a UN Definitive) exist as a single, a combo with

#194-195, and as a MI4.

#3 Scott #197-198 (issued for the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the UN Law Commission) exist as a single, a combo and a MI4.

#3b Scott #C14 (issued as an airmail stamp) exist as a single, a combo with #197-198) and as a MI4.

#4 Scott #199-200 (Issued for the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the ILO) exist as singles, combo and as a MI4.

### CANCEL TYPES

There were two cancel types used. The small FD general cancel (See Figure #1) and the larger “roller” FD cancel (See Figure #2).

### VARIETIES UNSEEN

Despite having owned several sets of these FDCs I have never see these varieties:

#1 I have never seen the small cancel used on the combo cover for #194-195 and #196. It may be that the stamps did not lend themselves to using the small cancel on one cover (See image #3 using the large cancel).

#2 As with the other issue I have never seen the small cancel used on the combo cover for #197-198 and #C14. (See Figure 4 using the large cancel).

#3 Gaines lists MI4s for both #196 and #C14. I have never seen an example offered of either one at any time.

#4 There seems to be no usage of the small cancel on any of the MI4 FDCs. Like the combo covers I suspect the small cancel did not cover all the stamps and was not used.

Shown as Figure 5 is a MI4 of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the ILO issue #199-#200 using the large roller cancel.

## ERRORS

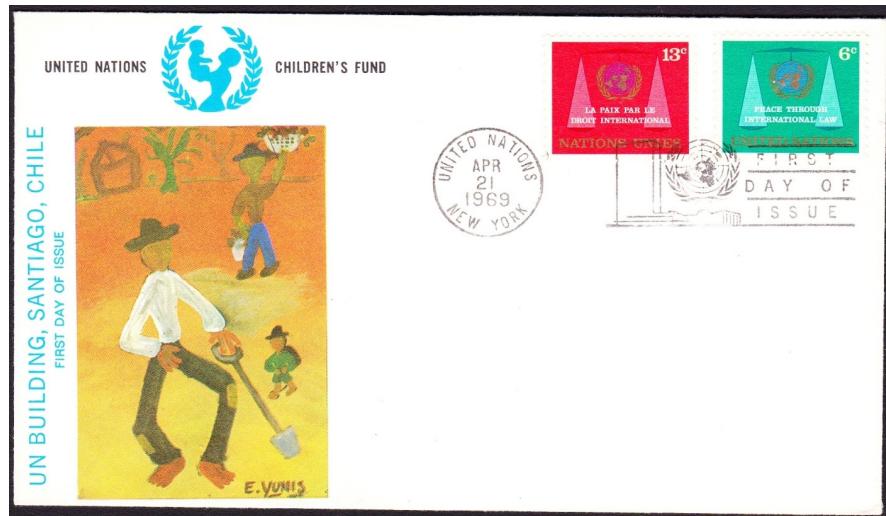


Fig. 6: UNICEF Cachet #2 used in ERROR for International Law Issue

The series has one known error - the use of the cachet for #194-195 (miner image) for #197-198 which used the flower cachet (See Figure 6) on a combo cover with the small cancel.

## Universal Peace Congresses, 1899 to 1939

Recently I found an interesting postcard, shown in Figures 1 and 2. The card says it is for the 19th Universal Peace Congress, held in Rome, Italy in 1911. There was a series of 33 Universal Peace Congresses held between 1899 and 1939. I decided to do some research and find what other postal history I could find for these Peace Congresses.

The first thing I discovered was that there was no such congress held in Rome in 1911. The 18th Universal Peace Congress was held in Stockholm, Sweden in 1910, and the 19th Universal Peace Congress was held in Geneva, Switzerland in 1912. From 1899 to 1908, the congress had been held virtually every year, with the only gaps being 1895, 1898 and 1899. So, perhaps it was tentatively planned for the congress to be held in Rome in 1911, preparations were underway, and the plan fell through for unknown reasons.

This series of Universal Peace Congresses were non-governmental meetings organized by a number of national and international peace societies. At the first congress, held in Paris, France in 1889, these peace societies decided to unite under the name “International Union of Peace Societies”.

At the second congress, held in London, England in 1890, a committee was appointed to propose an “International Peace Bureau”.

At the third congress, held in Rome, Italy in 1891, a permanent “International Peace Bureau” was established, to be headquartered in Bern, Switzerland. This Bureau would be a clearing house for information about the peace movement, and would be the executive office of the “International Union of Peace Societies”. The third congress was the first congress to be attended by Bertha von Suttner of Austria, beginning her 25 years of peace activism. *See Fran Adam’s one-page exhibit (on next page after this article) on von Suttner’s attending the 13th Congress in Boston in 1904.*

Membership in the International Peace Bureau (IPB) grew rapidly. It took over the organizing of the Universal Peace Congresses. It published a bimonthly bulletin, with a print run of 3000. In 1897, there were 65 peace societies in 14 countries which were members of IPB.

The Nobel Peace Prize was first awarded in 1901. In 1905, Bertha von Suttner received the prize “for her audacity to oppose the horrors of war “ In 1908, Fredrik Bajer, from Denmark, the first President of the International Peace Bureau, was awarded the prize. And in 1910, the International Peace Bureau itself was awarded the prize.

The 1st Congress in Paris, 1889, took place during the “*Exposition Universelle de Paris*”, which was held May 6-October 31, 1889. The Eifel Tower was built for this exposition.

The 5th Congress in Chicago, 1893, was held during the “*World Columbian Exposition*” which was held from May 1 to October 30, 1893.

The 9th Congress in Paris, 1900, was held in connection with a display on peace during the “*Exposition Universelle (Paris Exposition)*” held April 14 to November 12, 1900.

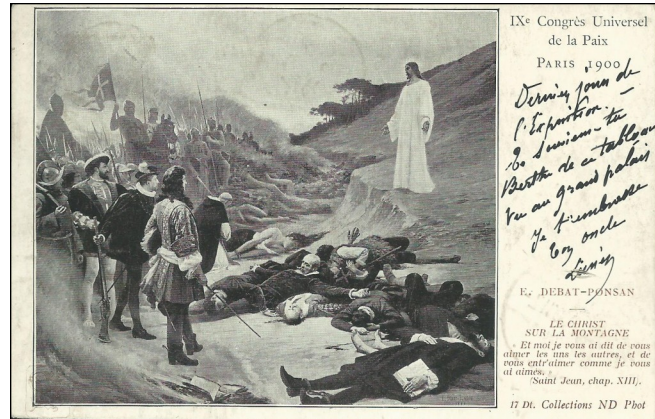


Fig. 3: Postcard from the 9th Congress, Paris, 1900. Picture side.

The earliest postal history found so far are postcards for the 9th Congress, Paris, France, 1900. and the 14th Congress, Lucerne, Switzerland, 1905. These cards are shown in Figures 3-6.

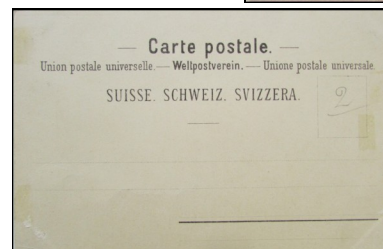


Fig. 6: Message side of Lucerne Card.

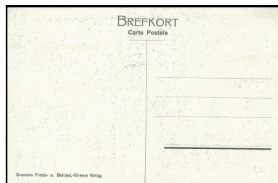


Fig. 10: Message Side Of Stockholm Card

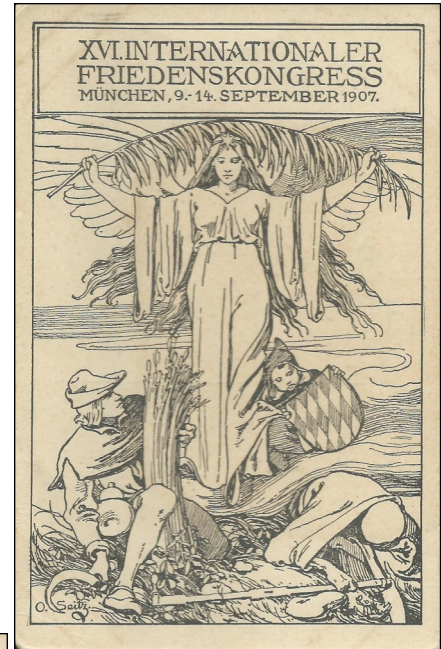
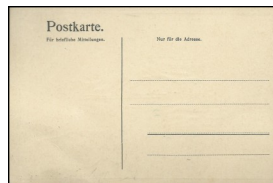


Fig. 7: Postcard for 16th Congress, Munich, Germany, 1907.

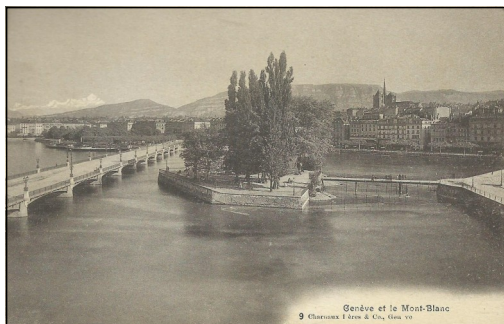


Fig. 13: Picture side of Card #2 (Chamaux freres #9), 19th Congress in Geneva, 1912

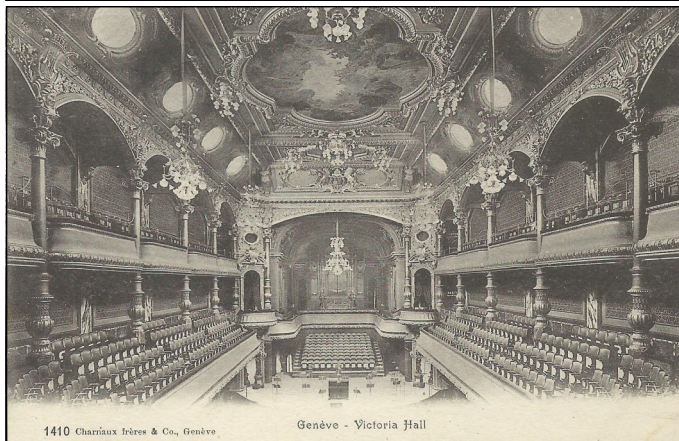


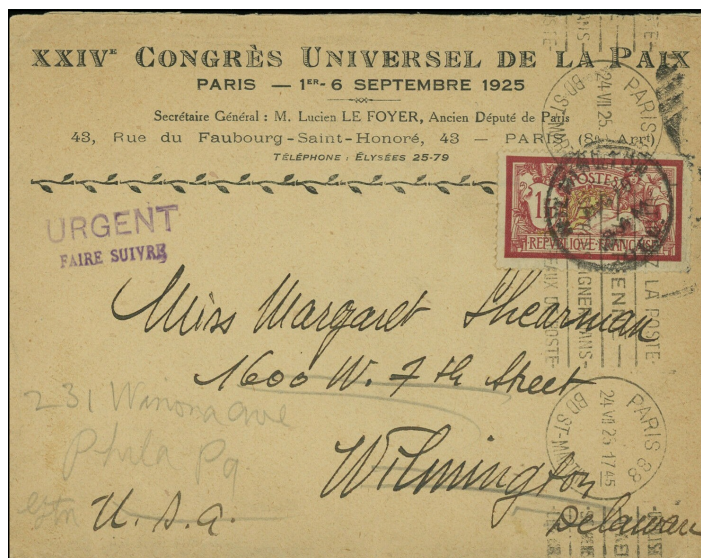
Fig. 20: Picture side of Card #6 (Charnaux freres #1410), 19th Congress in Geneva, 1912

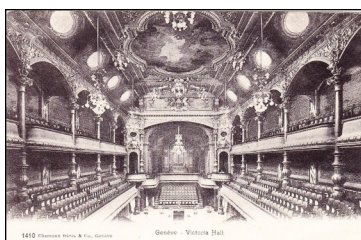


Fig. 23: Picture Side of postcard for the 1926 Geneva Congress

A postcard from the 25th Congress, held in Geneva in 1926, is shown in Figures 23 and 24. The message side is like the 1912 cards, with an inscription added for the 1926 congress. The picture side is the same as the 1912 Card #6. Whether 1926 cards were produced with the other images is not known.

Some thirty years ago, I saw an image of a Service cover from the 26th Congress, held in Warsaw, Poland in 1928. At that time, it was held by another UN collector. I have been unable to locate the cover, or an image of it.

The last Congress, the 33rd, was held in Zurich, Switzerland in 1939. The Congress concluded just four days before Germany invaded Poland, marking the beginning of World War II.

What I have presented here is hopefully just a start of learning about the postal history of these interesting peace congresses. Please be on the lookout for other material. Let us know about it and we will report it in these pages.

## United Nations Service Center, Washington, DC During WWII

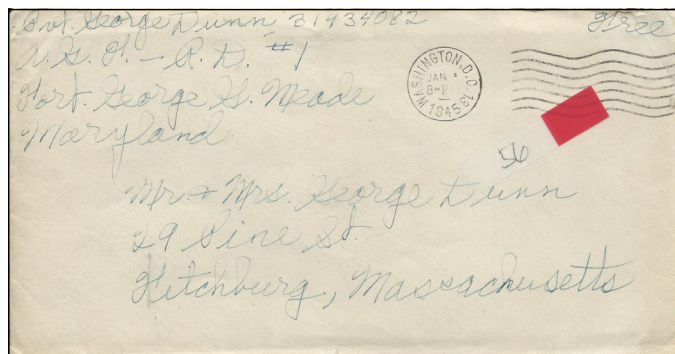


Fig. 1: 1945 Free Mail from Soldier at Fort Meade to Massachusetts. Note Numbered red tab tied to the cover by the Jan.1 Cancel

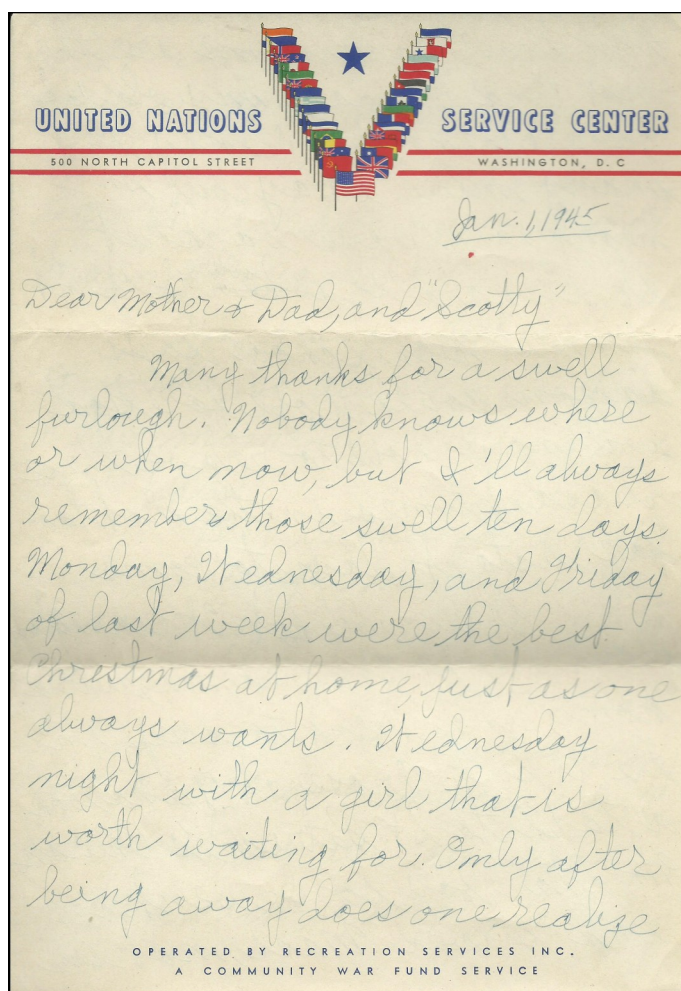


Fig. 2: First Page of Letter Home, on UN Service Center Stationery

The UN Service Center in Washington has been covered in three previous Journal articles, in June 1966 (page 7), by Dick Powers, in December 2014, by myself, and in October 2016, by Fran Adams. Post cards from the Center were shown in 1966 and 2014, matchbooks in 2014, and unused stationery in 2016. Figure 1 shows a Jan. 1, 1945 cover from an Army Private to his parents in Massachusetts. Figure 2 shows the contents, a four page handwritten letter on Service Center stationery.

The letter:

Jan. 1, 1945

Dear Mother & Dad, and "Scotty"

Many thanks for a swell furlough. Nobody knows when now, but I'll always remember those swell ten days. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday of last week were the best Christmas at home, just as one always wants. Wednesday night with a girl that was worth waiting for. Only after being away does one realize that those back home are the best. And Friday, my old job back again. Yes, I may be many miles away but my heart is always back at St. Bernard's, where I spent the best high school days one could hope for. God willing, I hope to relive these pleasant times in the not too distant days to come.

Well, we hit Washington about 1 A.M. Washed, ate, wired home, and went to sleep in the U.S.O. Arose at 7 and took a taxi to St. Patrick's Church. No alter boy so I went in and served Mass, not in red cassock and white surplice, but in the khaki of the U.S. Army. What a privilege. Will leave on a special train for camp at 11:30.'

Don't know what else to write, so I guess I'll spend a few moments relaxing with my pals.

Best wishes for a happy and successful new year. May peace, a speedy, just, and lasting one, be ours very soon. Please pray for me and all of us. Only God knows how much we'll need it, so we can come safely back to more Christmases at home; girls like Mary; and enjoyable pastimes like basketball.

## Fun with Forerunners, #9

In this installment of Fun with Forerunners we look at an interesting cover (Figure 1) from the New York City Mayor's office to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA).

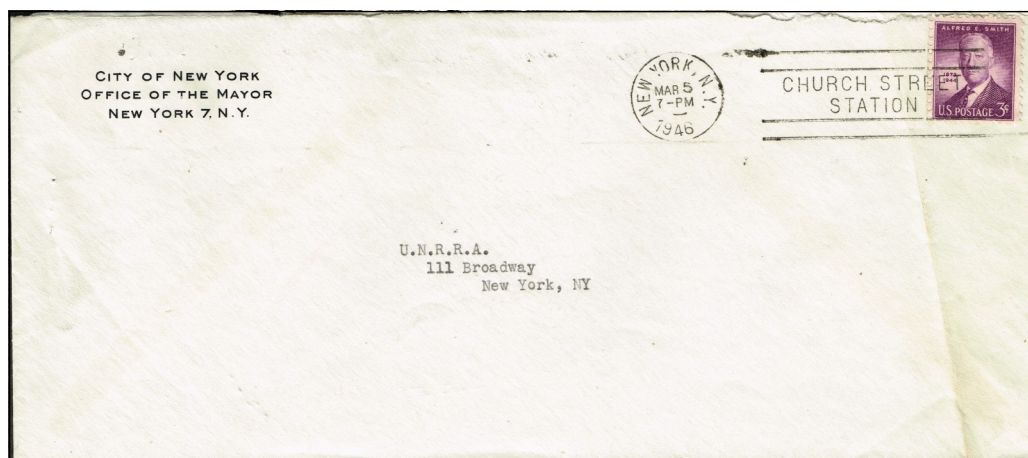


Fig. 1:

In March of 1946, William O'Dwyer, was the Mayor of New York City. He was well known for his personal efforts to bring the permanent headquarters of the United Nations to the city.

UNRRA, was created by 44 nations that convened at Atlantic City in November 1943. The organization was created to help repatriate, feed, clothe, and provide temporary shelter for millions of refugees as a result of displacement during World War II. UNRRA maintained many offices worldwide, including several in the United States. In New York, UNRRA established a liaison office with the United Nations at 111 Broadway. This office remained at this location from June 1, 1944 through November 30, 1947. This location is known as the Trinity Building in NYC's financial district.

The letter contained a small enclosure pictured here of a pre-printed communication memo from the Mayor's office (Figure 2), asking the UNRRA to take "Such action as the facts of the case may warrant."

It appears that a gentleman in Greece, Mr. Andreas Adriteos had written to the Mayor's office requesting clothing. I imagine with Mayor Dwyer's popularity and position, Mr. Adriteos thought he could assist him. The Mayor's office dispatched the communication and probably Mr. Adriteos' letter to the UNRRA office on the evening of March 5<sup>th</sup>, via the US Post office at Church Street Station, by letter paying the 3c domestic letter rate. The communication was received the following day, March 6<sup>th</sup>, as indicated on the communication by UNRRA Receipt imprint from the UNRRA Mail Unit (Gaines D.101). I wonder if Mr. Adriteos received anything in return for his efforts.

Submissions should include text (Word document or equivalent) and images (preferably .jpg files) separately. New authors are welcome and assistance will be given if needed.

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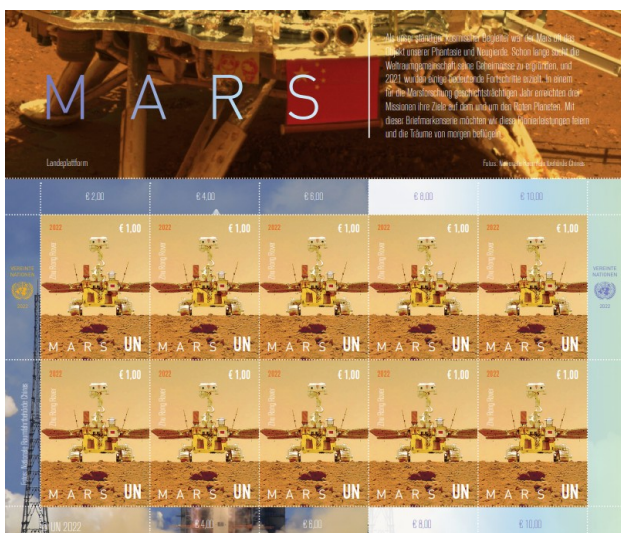
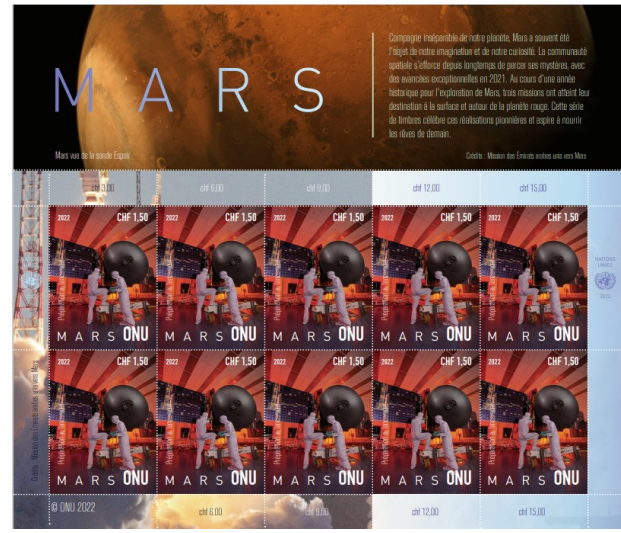
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
