During my terms as president, the one person who has continually contributed more than any other is our editor, Blanton (Clem) Clement, Jr. As a result, he is without doubt, the most informed person we have and I'm confident he will continue to use his gained knowledge and expertise to strengthen our organization.

Outside the realm of UNP, I wish to mention two persons who have untiringly and with great devotion given much to our hobby. They are Arleigh Gaines, editor of United Nations Philately, and Gisela Grunewald, Chief, United Nations Postal Administration. At that, they would be much less effective without us as their supporters.

United Nations Update (XV)

By the time these lines are read, AMERIPEX will have become a past event, one at
which UNPA tried to make itself noticed, and
probably with some success. The first day of
issue of the "Philately, the International
Hobby" stamps coincided and was no doubt
planned for the opening day of AMERIPEX. In
the opinion of this writer, the UN designs
are head and shoulders superior to those
contained in the US booklet. Then, another
first, UNPA, with the permission of the US
Postal Service, provided a special cancel for
the opening day (so far only San Francisco
had been the exception) and also a Show Card,
the first of its kind, obtainable only at the
Show. The 22th of May also brought to light
the 29th Souvenir Card on which the three new
stamps are reproduced along with two issued
for the 25th Anniversary of UNPA in 1976, and
a message for Secretary General Perez de
Cuellar.

The number of stamps printed in dollar denominations was rather small - 1,200,000 or only 200,000 more than the now famous 3c "Mother and Child" human rights stamp issued in 1954. This stamp is in part reproduced on the current 22 center. It seems to me that this size printing has become realistic. The results bear watching.

Writing in the 5 April issue of Stamp Collector, its Executive Editor Kyle Jansson says in an editorial on the subject that the United Nations "Stamp Collecting" stamps "are its latest effort to improve its printing designs and stamp subjects". quoting UNPA Chief G. Grunewald he adds "we have been a little more forthright in each succeeding year" (since 1983). Grunewald then mentions two specific changes: the first which resulted in part from feedback from collectors was to vary the approaches - which means also getting away from the long series of abstract designs - and the second, actually to show people working for institutions portrayed on stamps. In the past one of the many things that were considered "no no's" on UN stamps was to portray human beings, the main objection being that if you had a person of one ethnic background you would have to have others of other backgrounds and one did not want to offend anyone. This was again and again emphasized to artists and designers who wrote in for instructions about a particular stamp issue. I well remember, after the death of Dag Hammarskjold how some of us wanted the UN to issue a mourning stamp with black around his portrait. That was not to be and we had to settle for a stamp showing the UN flag at half mast. Perhaps one of the interesting developments in this otherwise rather dull period of UN philately is to notice (especially from a vantage point at some distance from the UN) how things change. Not only do old timers disappear but the very rules they

conceived and enforced seem to be changed almost deliberately.

There is no mistaking the ethnic origin of the stamp collector portrayed on the 6.50 Shillings "Briefmarkensammeln" stamp. Some years ago such a design would have been rejected outright. In this line of thought, it was announced at the MILCOPEX Show at Milwaukee, Wisconsin that UNPA was about to start a new series of stamps honoring Secretaries—General of the UN, beginning in 1987 with Trygve Lie of Norway. So in 1988, we shall presumably have Dag Hammarskjold after all and after him U Thant who was a stamp collector.


But back to the 22 May issue, UNPA Chief Grunewald said that Czeslaw Slania, the famous Swedish designer who for the first time used his talent to design UN stamps, "has done an absolute miracle". Not only did he improve upon the efforts of the Swedish and US engravers in the products contained in the Stockholmia and Stamp Collecting booklets


but "he succeeded in capturing the distortion in a stamp design when it is neat the edge of the magnifying glass". Will this "miracle" bring about a long hoped for sell out? That could be and if it happened, it would do the cause of UN philately a great deal of good.

The Geneva version is perhaps the least striking of the three designs. It looks too crowded and I do not like the translation of "hobby" as "passe-temps". In French a "passe-temps" is something we do to fill in idle hours, such as doing cross word puzzles at an airport waiting for a connection or a delayed plane. The word in my humble opinion does not convey the idea of seriousness with which we collectors look upon our hobby. Much better would have been the use of "marotte" or "recreation". Best of all, the word "dada". I admit it is somewhat colloquial but it conveys a feeling of fondness. That is the word used by collectors in France. As far as I am concerned UN philately is indeed still "mon dada".

UNPA News

The UN issue on 22 May 1986 at AMERIPEX nad a number of firsts. For the first time, UNPA-New York nad a first day cancel other than New York or San Francisco. Also UNPA-New York issued its first show card ever. And a special souvenir folder was issued jointly by the United Nations, the United States, and Sweden, all using stamps issued on the "Philately" theme. It should be noted that the show card could be obtained only at the show, but the folder is available by mail order.

In addition to the six stamps, a souvenir card was issued. An AMERIPEX snow cacnet was available. Also, a new Headquarters cacnet envelope was available for the first time.

Another new issue will follow quickly, on 20 June 1986, for the International Year of Peace, in conjunction with the West German stamp show, UNOPax 86. It is interesting that six different designs are used for these stamps. The stamps and their first day cancellations are shown below. Another souvenir card will be issued in conjunction with this issue.


United Nations Related Meters from the USA: Addenda



AMERIPEX Show Notes

- In addition to "firsts", the "Philately" issue was one of the few issues which had a first day ceremony outside of New York or San Francisco (the earlier ones used New York first day cancellations). Previous ceremonies recalled were Seattle in 1960 and Chicago in 1962. Do you know of others? Also, the issue is one of the few which had a specially commissioned design rather than selecting the design from an open competition; according to UNPA Chief Gruenwald, we can expect commissioned designs more often in the future.
- At the UNP board meeting, "The Western Arm" was accepted as an official UNP chapter for the San Francisco area. Other actions included plans for promoting Journal advertising, UNP membership, and literature sales. You will be hearing more about these as the plans are implemented.
- 3. Attendees at the UNP annual meeting included not only a number from Illinois, but those from California, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Missouri, Nevada, New York, North Carolina, Onio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Washington state. We truly have a cational Washington state. We truly have a national organization.

At the meeting, the program consisted of a talk and question and answer session with UNPA Cnief Gisela Grunewald. Sne told us about the UNPA archives, what's in it, how one can see it (appropriate parts will De shown to serious researchers), and the current archive reorganization and cataloguing which is going on. Grunewald told us about plans for next year's stamp issues (she asked us not to publish) and asked for suggestions for future stamp subjects.

An interesting new UNPA movie was shown on the design and production of the Hans Erni stamps on "A Future for Refugees". This movie is available for loan if you want to promote UN philately in your area.

 A donation auction of 61 lots of UN material was sold with spirited bidding, with \$683 collected for our needy treasury. Donations of the material had been made by David S.J. Alexander, Michael Armus, Clem Clement, Ben Cohen, Herbert E. Conway, Henry Gitner, Carl and Ruth Grissman, Mike Konnick, Hugh McLellan, Philip Okney, John Pastoral, Richard Powers, Reuben Ramkissoon, Darrell Rosen, Robert Smith, and Mac Weintroub.



- 5. A UNP booth was maintained throughout the show, and was the scene of renewal of old friendships and the making of many new ones. One booth visitor was C. Spoelman, an AMERIPEX commissioner from the Netherlands, who is President of the Dutch UN collectors group.
- 6. At the meeting of the American Philatelic Society held at the show, Jack Mayer and Ben Cohen were nonored for having been members of APS for 25 years. Congratulations, Jack and Ben!
- 7. There were only two UN-related exhibits at the show. An exhibit of by Dietrich Oldenburg of Germany was in the Championship Class, entitled "The Universal Postal Union and its Jubilees". Ine championship class is limited to exhibits that have won three large golds in the last ten years. As you can imagine, much beautiful UPU material was seen in these frames.
- The other UN exhibit was in the "Fun in Philately" section of the show. Some 50+

- one frame exhibits were assembled, each to be sold to COPO for "cost", not to exceed \$25. Charles Berg exhibited WFUNA FDCs.
- 9. UNPA won second place amoung the government exhibits with an interesting exhibit of UN material including artist's sketches and die proofs. But the crowds at the UNPA sales booth indicate that UN collecting is alive and well. Also, many of us found that a wealth of UN material in the dealer's sales booths. A number of "finds" were made.
- 10. There were talks galore at AMERIPEX, generally about 16 a day. Ben Cohen presented a slide show on UN collecting in general on the final day of the show, followed immediately by Charles Berg's slide show on collecting first day covers.
- 11. A slightly smaller version of the "Philately" souvenir card was bound in the AMERIPEX directory. Sold for \$20 at the show, it's now \$25 (with the awards list) by mail from AMERIPEX, 5944 W. Montrose, Chicago, IL 60634.

Meter Notes.. The World Bank

Covers representing the world's monetary system have received little interest amongst United Nations collectors despite the fact that the agencies are an integral part of the UN's activities. Possibly the only exception to this are the early forerunner covers that represent activities of the League of Nations' Economic and Financial Organization which appear to be very rare and command very high prices when brought to auction.

The World Bank is one of the major entities in today's financial element. The headquarters is in Washington, DC. Covers from the agency are reasonably common but have not captured the interest of collectors. This is probably due to their "common-looking" appearance in comparison to the myriad amount of commercial mail that passes through our postal system daily. Official mail is franked with meters and much of it is in the form of publications which travel by means other than first class. A good share of that mail comes in large manila envelopes which are also "uninviting" to collect. Perhaps the most exciting time in World Bank cover collecting was back in 1983 when for a very brief time a meter slogan was used which referred to the agency; this slogan is shown below.



The above slogan was used on meters PB 3321965 and PB 3321979 only. Most of the "BANK's" mail uses so-called directional slogans which indicate to the post office the type of mail being sent which indicates the postal rate used. Directional slogans seen currently on such mail are as follows:

Perhaps there are others. In particular are several machines which thus far have only been seen with "dateless" impressions. Confirming dates of use is often difficult if not totally impossible.

Recently two covers emerged which add interest to this area of collecting. Both are on machine PB 3321979 are are date errors, both presumably in 1984. These are illustrated below.







